Konan Girls' Learning

Konan Girls' School, established in 1920, consists of a junior and a senior high school and is affiliated with Konan Women's University.

There are six grades: three in the junior high and three in the senior high school. The total enrollment is around 1050 students.

The student body of each grade is divided into five classes.

The faculty includes 58 full-time teachers, the principal, the head teacher, two vice head teachers and 36 part-time teachers.

Konan Girls' Junior and Senior High School pursues an ideal education, which is to bring up independent women who have intelligence and dignity and to prepare them to go forward in their own lives and in society in a positive manner.

Characteristics of the Curriculum

There are two courses, the Special Advanced Course and the Standard Course. In the Special Advanced Course, the curriculum has been designed for students who wish to go on to national and other public universities. In the Standard Course, the curriculum has been designed for students with diverse future plans.

The education system of Konan Girls' School is structured in three stages, which transcend the usual boundaries between junior and senior high school.

First Stage

Secondary School Fundamentals

The 7th and 8th grades are what we call the fundamental period. During this stage the students establish the basic academic skills necessary for their studies at Konan. It also serves as a transition period from the cooperative atmosphere of elementary school to the more competitive spirit of high school. English education is a core focus. English conversation is taught by native speakers of English and computer assisted language learning is available.

Second Stage

Academic Development The 9th and 10th grade students are in the stage where they enhance and more sharply define their academic abilities and begin to identify and focus on areas of interest they wish to pursue.

Third Stage

Post-Secondary Preparation

The 11th and 12th grade students in this final stage actively pursue the disciplines that are related to their future interests in academia and their future careers. The students are offered a variety of elective courses taught in relatively small classes in which students set their post-secondary education goals. In these grades students have many opportunities to develop leadership skills.

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

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In 1920 Konan Girls' School was founded by progressive business people who dreamed of giving their children an ideal education based on liberalism, in contrast to the rigidly uniform education given by most schools in those days.

In 1923 Omote Jinroku became the first principal and in the following twenty-two years established the foundation of the education of Konan: the school's mottos, its principles of education, the school emblem, and the school song.

Over ninety-odd years Konan has surmounted various disasters, such as great floods, wartime fires and the great Hanshin Earthquake, and has continued to develop, adding Konan Women's University and Graduate School.

With the great change in women's circumstances, girls are more inspired to seek professional roles in the world. Accordingly, Konan helps students to choose and prepare for their future careers.

In 2009 construction of a new school building was begun to commemorate the school's 90th anniversary. With completion of the building in March of 2012, Konan has taken a significant step toward another decade of progress.
